A native of Belleville, Andrew is a member of an elite set. He's one of a handful of talented ballet dancers being trained in a program of disci-pline and dedication at the National Pallet School in To-

Children from Canada, the United States and Europe spend 11 months of the year studying ballet, rythmics, music and theatre arts as well

as the usual school subjects.

The dancers are under constant pressure to perform perfectly, said Andrew. "I feel I just want to work hard because I want to be the best."

He is performing two roles

this year in the traditional Christmas ballet — The Nutcracker - at the O'Keefe Cen-

As the 'naughty boy' and jumps and moves constantly — "tiring myself out," he

He has what he describes as a "truckload" of nervous twitches from his training. "The exercise strains parts of your body you don't normally use," he explains.

His biggest worry right now is his height. "I won't be tall enough to dance soon if I don't start growing faster," he complained. "But I'm going to hang in there as long as I can."

His mind is made up about his career. If it isn't ballet it will be choreography, jazz, or music - "anything related to dancing," he said.
