Four Toronto officers, three of them members of the 48th Highlanders, have been listed as wounded, and another is reported as having died of wounds, as a result of enemy action on the Italian front in mid-December. The wounded men are now in hospital at Malta.

A former figure-skating champion and skating partner of Sonja Henie, Lieut. Stewart Reburn, who served throughout the Sicilian campaign, is among those named in the army casualty list.

#### **Suffers Gunshot Wound.**

Capt. Charles Hector Lithgow, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Lithgow, 264 Oriole Parkway, received gunshot wounds in the right shoulder and back on Dec. 18, his father, who is general manager of the Manufacturer's Life Insurance Company here, said yesterday.

The 23-year-old officer, who enlisted in the Royal Canadian Regiment in 1940 after his graduation from the Royal Military College, went overseas in September, 1940. He was born in Toronto and is a graduate of Trinity College.

Lieut. George Owen Phibbs, whose wife, Mrs. Sally H. Phibbs, lives at 179 Teddington Park, is also recovering from gunshot wounds received during an engagement Dec. 17. He enlisted in the 48th Highlanders in 1940 and went overseas in the summer of 1940. He was born in Toronto and educated at Upper Canada College and St. Andrews.

#### **Injured in Left Arm.**

Lt. Norman Brooke Bell, son of Mrs. Helen Munroe Coste, 185 Heath St., was wounded in the left arm on Dec. 18. He enlisted soon after the outbreak of war and went overseas with the 48th Highlanders. He was born in Toronto and is a graduate of Upper Canada College. He also attended Trinity College.

Capt. George C. E. Dinwiddie, whose mother, Mrs. Mary Dinwiddie, lives at 1096 Yonge St., is the officer reported as having died of wounds.
