The 23-year-old officer, who €nlisted in the Royal Canadian Regi-ment in 1940 after his graduation from the Royal Military College, went overseas in September, 1940. He was born in Toronto and is a graduate of Trinity College.

Lieut, George Owen Phibbs, whose wife, Mrs, Sally H. Phibbs, lives at 179 Teddington Park, is also recovering from gunshot wounds received during an engagement Dec. 17. He enlisted in the 48th Highlanders in 1940 and went overseas in the summer of 1940. He was born in Toronto and educated at Upper Canada; College and St. Andrews.
