ON THE MAIN STREET

Another chapter in the life of the amazing Hon. Leslie M. Frost was chronicled Sunday morning at Pleasant Point when he was called on to make the announcements in connection with the 45th Anniversary of the Union Church in the Wildwood.

He was in top form as he quietly and in semi-humorous vein recalled some of the history of the church and a few of its followers.

The honourable gentleman was to a degree in a sentimental mood as he referred to the days when he and his brother Cecil Frost returned from

World War I, and he was called upon to draw up a constitution of the newly formed Pleasant Point Union Church which still stands.

"I had been wounded in the war and I was not feeling at my best, far from it. I was actually sick and wounded but Pleasant Point proved to be a tonic," said the former Premier after the service. "Here Mrs. Frost and I established our summer home and became residents of Pleasant Point and members of this church. In those days I found the Point lived up to its name, for it was peaceful and pleasant, and



the waters of Sturgeon Lake, its banks and wooded area appealed to me, and it has meant so much to me through many trying and busy years," he said.

When making the announcements and welcoming the guest minister, Rev. Hugh Pritchard of Cambridge Street United Church, Mr. Frost referred to the erection of the

Union Church and the services rendered by the late Dr. Irvine, with whom he also hunted and fished; to Mrs. Grace Mitchell - Nelson who wrote the history of the church and to the late Mat Sisson and his wife who were active in Pleasant Point matters. Reference was also made to Oliver Hezzlewood who lived in the large log cottage built by the late Felix Forbert. Mr. Hezzlewood was for many years identified as secretary of the McLaughlin General Motors Company in Oshawa.

Mr. Frost paid compliment to Mr. and Mrs. Burrige for their faithful services in connection with the Union Church.

Rev. Pritchard delivered an impressive sermon and the guest soloist was Miss Thompson of Toronto, and formerly of Omemee.

Later when Mr. Frost was

chatting with friends he stated the coming of a community college to Lindsay should be an asset to the town. He intimated other good things are in store for Lindsay.
