The days when the large McKenzie yacht was tied up in the canal near the high The days when the bridge. family had a large dairy herd on a farm near the old Grand Trunk railway station; the time when the McKenzie mansion was filled with visitors; the days when the quaint old Presbyterian Church was moved from close proximity to the McKenzie home, to a new location on the opposite side of the road.

These were the days when the busiest store was a hardware, and Staples, a young' school teacher from Long Point, Balsam Lake, had hardware stores at Victoria Road and Kirkfield, and did a "whale of a business" with Lady McKenzie and family.

Kirkfield was "on the map" and several stores catered to the wants of the people. Township do with the historical plaque and where will it find a suitable resting place?
