Hanes Boxall, hardware merchant, president of the Citizen's Band, head of the Son's of England Society, president of the Lindsay Old Boys Association and superintendent of Cambridge Street Methodist church for nearly a quarter of a century.

B. L. McLean, Mutual Life Insurance Co., chairman of the Board of Education, president of the Lindsay Central Exhibition and the second president of the Kiwanis Club.

T. H. Stinson, president of the Kiwanis Club, president of Victoria Trust and Loan Co., he was also a leader in the Santa Claus Stocking Fund, president of the Conservative Association and general manager of Victoria and Grey Trust Company.

W. W. Staples vice-president of Dundas and Flavelle mercantile store, superintendent of Cambridge Street Methodist Sunday school, and clerk of the Surrogate court.

Jas. B. Begg, owner of Lindsay Soda Water Works, mayor of Lindsay, founder of the Gothic Masonic Lodge and candidate for the Liberal party.

W. J. Carlisle, manager of

the Neill Shoe store, past president of the Curling Club and Lawn Bowling Club and Horticultural Society.

J. D. Flavelle, of Flavelle Milling Co., Flavelle Department store and the dean of Ontario curlers, bicyclists and canoeists.

Newton Smale, a walking encyclopedia of local historical matters and an official of Victoria Trust Co.

Richard Butler, proprietor of the Butler Hotel, now Fee Motors, past president of the Lindsay Curling Club, past president of the Ontario Curling Association, and past president of several hockey and baseball clubs.

Walter Reesor, manager of Lindsay Hydro Electric, past president of the Lindsay Curling Club and the Ontario Curling Club, a goal getter with the lacrosse team and past president of the Rotary Club.

L. V. O'Connor, barrister,

past president of the Ontario Curling Association and one of the founders of the St. Mary's Lawn Bowling Club.

Three former Lindsay mayors known as the three horsemen, who lifted the town out of the red in municipal politics, financially and otherwise J. E. Anderson, Q.C., Crown Attorney, grandmaster of the I.L.L.F., past president of the Curling Club. Col. F. J. Carew who was decorated with the order of the British Empire in World War One, past president of the Lindsay Curling Club, and past president of the Lindsay Fair Board.

W. S. W. Breese, head master of the Collégiate Institute past president of the Lindsay Curling Club.
