# WAS IT A JOB?

To be watched and suspected is the unenv able position of those who attain to place and power. This is the case in the highest position as well as in the lowest. Our Town Council, unfortunately, are not, like Casar's wife, "above suspicion." Whether there are grounds for complaint is not for us to say-perhaps our town readers can decide? But it is asserted that at their last meeting, the Town Council perpetrated a job! The bridge over the Seugog river was built by Government aid \$200 and private subscription \$200-making in all the sum of \$400. The completion of the bridge and approaches cost exactly \$413 -just \$13 more than the sum provided for that purpose. At the last meeting of Council. a motion was passed granting \$100 for the said bridge; and immediately after a further sum of \$150 was given to build a temporary bridge above the Mills. It is said that the grant of \$100, when only \$13 was required, was passed unopposed by the Councillors for the East ward, in consideration of their receiving the sum of \$150 as above mentioned. This is the whole affair. And while we would be among the first to cry out against and condemn extravagant expenditure of town monies, we fail to discover anything like extravagance here or anything in the shape of a job! The total sum subscribed by individuals was not forthcoming when required; but the gentleman who gave his obligation to the contractor had to meet his engagement; and as the bridge is confessedly a great convenience to the town, we think the Council acted quite properly in granting the above-mentioned sum. On the other hand, it is equally clear that public convenience, as well as public safety, demands the erection of a more permanent structure to the east end of the town than the one at present used. The Council therefore, we believe, met the wishes of the majority of the ratepayers when they granted a further sum of \$150 for that purpose. On the whole, there is no room for complaint; and we trust that, in the future, we will have as small cause for fault-finding, as in alleged last job of the Lindsay Town Council.
