OUR MEMBER AND THE COBBOURG DINNER.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE CANADIAN POST.

MR. EDITOR.—It is not my intention in troubling you with this communication, to enter into a controversy with your Eidon correspondent, but simply to state a few facts with reference to Mr. Dunsford's position before the electors of the County of Victoria.

At the meeting of the Reform Convention, where Mr. Dunsford was chosen as a candidate for Legislative honors, he stated that he was a Liberal Conservative; that he was in favor of Representation based upon Population; that he was opposed to giving any more Government aid to the Grand Trunk Railway, and to the expenditure of money by the Ministry without the consent of Parliament; that he would not pledge himself to oppose or support any Ministry, but if the Speech from the Throne did not embody the principle of Representation by Population, and a vote of want of confidence was brought in, based upon that question, he would vote want of confidence; and that he would at all times vote in accordance with the above principles, without regard to any Ministry.

These statements were reiterated on the day of Nomination, and repeated at Woodville, Oakwood, Little Britain, and the south-west part of the Township of Mariposa. The Clear Grits of the County of Victoria, though they would have preferred—and they expressed themselves so at the Convention—a thorough Oppositionist, supported Mr. Dunsford, understanding well that he was to occupy an independent position—and with that understanding, and no other, a large proportion of the Catholic electors, as well as many Orangemen and Liberal Conservatives, gave to Mr. Dunsford a hearty support.

Our opponents, during the canvass, repeatedly stated that he had sold himself to the Clear Grits, and that he professed independent merely to obtain Conservative support. Our reply was, that we do not claim him as the exponent of Reform principles, but we claim that he is an honest man, that he will be the firm supporter of certain great principles, and that he will strenuously oppose the repetition or continuance of certain great wrongs.

By the united efforts of Moderate Reformers, Clear Grits, Catholics and Liberal Conservatives, Mr. Dunsford was triumphantly returned by a majority of 231, as the Member for the County of Victoria. On the evening of the 14th day of election, at the Committee-room in Lindsay, in presence of a large number of his most prominent supporters, it was most distinctly stated and approved of, that he should continue to occupy that same independent position, that any deviation would be prejudicial to the interests of the party who supported him; that if he proved true to the principles enunciated by him at the Convention and during the canvass, and should ask to be again returned Member for Victoria, that we would give him the same hearty support, and we felt confident, with a like happy result; but if he proved untrue to the trust reposed, the fate of John Cameron—an ignominious defeat at the polls—awaited him. Mr. Dunsford's character for integrity was the guarantee that his supporters had, that he would remain unpledged to support or oppose any Ministry.

Now, we ask, how could he consistently attend an Opposition dinner given to himself and others, as Opposition Members of Parliament? What could he say to any elector who had heard him state that he would not pledge himself to support the present Ministry, had he attended that dinner, where none but Opposition Members were expected to be present, and where none but Opposition sentiments were expected to be expressed? Had he attended a Ministerial dinner, "Rob Roy" and others would have pronounced him a Ministerialist; and had he been present at the Cobourg dinner, he could have claimed no longer that he was independent.

It would have been lamentable indeed had the man who owed his election to his occupying an independent position, by his first act, and that, too, long before the meeting of Parliament, committed himself to any political party; and the man who would drive Mr. Dunsford into that course is not consulting the true interests of the Reformers of the County of Victoria. He takes the same stand now that he took at the Convention, and we must blame ourselves, not him, if he adheres to the platform upon which we accepted him.

We regret very much that Mr. Dunsford is not a thorough Oppositionist. We feel that the present Ministry are not worthy of confidence; but we supported him as a Liberal Conservative, holding certain great principles

in common with the Reformers of this County, with the distinct understanding, as far as the present or any other Ministry were concerned, he was to remain unpledged. Having done so, we should be very sorry indeed to learn that he had suddenly ignored his promises, and without any real necessity, placed himself in opposition to many of his supporters.

Had Mr. Dunsford been returned as a pledged opponent of the present Ministry, then "Rob Roy's" remarks would have been applicable, as far as the Cobourg dinner is concerned; but this fresh shadowing of the policy of an untried man to be selfish and dishonorable, after the following style, i.e., "if he intends to use his friends and supporters as mere stepping-stones for the aggrandizement of himself and family," comes with a very bad grace from the redoubtable "Rob Roy" who claims to be his supporter.

How our friend "Rob Roy" could hold up our Member as above suspicion, before the election, and be among the first to publicly announce suspicions of a very grave character, not only calculated to injure our Member, but, if persisted in, to read under those men who, for the common good of our country and our country, united in urging from office Mr. Dunsford's predecessor, and all because he did not see fit to attend a public dinner—we really cannot understand.

We are well aware that our only safety is constantly watching the acts of our public men. They should feel that the eye of an intelligent public man is upon them. At the same time, every public man has a right to expect honorable treatment, especially from his own party. We believe that those great principles will not be conceded by any other than a Reform Ministry, we have no doubt but our Member will find himself voting with the Reformers of Upper Canada upon all these measures, and we have no doubt but that he will find himself forced into Opposition, on account of those measures—and, if so, he can consistently return to his constituents and ask them to re-elect him.

We hope that the electors of Victoria will not be influenced by imaginary fears, but that they will reserve their decision until our Member has an opportunity of voting in Parliament, and if he is not found supporting those principles by which the professions he has made at the Convention, irrespective of the party in power, then will be the time to talk of indignation meetings, to give vent to dark suspicions. But, till then, Mr. Dunsford has a right to expect fair treatment, especially from those who were so active in supporting him, as was our much esteemed friend "Rob Roy McGregor."

BY-LAW No. XIII. A BY-LAW TO RAISE BY WAY OF LOAN THE SUM OF ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, FOR THE ERECTION OF AN ENGINE-HOUSE, AND OTHER PURPOSES IN SAID BY-LAW MENTIONED.

WHEREAS it is incumbent upon the Municipal Council of the Town of Lindsay, to provide one or more Fire-Engines and other Fire Equipments, for the use of a Fire Brigade, a suitable Building, for the use of the same, several Water-Tanks, reconstructing the existing one, and for repairing the Streets and Bridges.

And whereas, to make provision for the above-mentioned purposes, it will be necessary for the said Council to raise by way of loan, upon its debentures, the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds.

And whereas, for the payment of the said sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds, and interest thereon, there will require to be raised annually, by Special Rate upon the taxable property in this Municipality, the sum of Nine Hundred and Sixty Dollars.

And whereas the amount of the whole of the rateable property of the said Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment-Roll of the said Municipality (being for the year 1861), is One Hundred and Sixty and one-tenth of one per cent, and the sum of money, as may be reasonably be obtained for the same, and to cause the moneys so to be raised to be paid over to the said Council, for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas, for paying the interest on the said sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds, and for creating an equal yearly Sinking Fund for paying the said principal sum, there will require to be raised and levied, in addition to all other rates, upon the taxable property of the said Municipality, an annual Special Rate of Two Cents and a Half of a Cent in the Dollar.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Town of Lindsay, and it is hereby enacted, That the Mayor do raise by way of loan, from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, upon the credit of debentures of the said Municipality, to the amount of One Thousand Five Hundred Pounds, such sum of money, as may be reasonably be obtained for the same, and to cause the moneys so to be raised to be paid over to the said Council, for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

II. That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor to issue such sufficient number of debentures to be issued, payable at the end of Ten years after the day when the said By-Law shall come into operation, and for such several sums as may be required, not less, however, than One Hundred Dollars each; and the said debentures shall be signed by the said Mayor, and be sealed with the seal of this Municipality.

III. That the said debentures shall be made payable in ten years, at the office of the Bank of Upper Canada in Lindsay, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

IV. That the said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of Six per centum per annum, from the date thereof; which interest shall be payable half-yearly, on the Twenty-fourth day of April and October in each year, at the office of the Bank of Upper Canada in Lindsay.

V. That for the purpose of paying the said interest, and forming a sinking fund for the payment of the said debentures, a Special Rate of Two Cents and one-tenth of a Cent in the Dollar, in addition to all other rates, be raised, levied and collected in each year, upon all the rateable property in the said Municipality, during the continuance of the said debentures, or any of them.

VI. That for the purpose of taking the Votes of the Municipal Electors on this By-Law, a Poll shall be opened and taken according to law, on Monday the Twenty-fourth day of October next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, at the following places, that is to say:—In the South Ward, at Mr. William McNeill's Tannery; in the North Ward, at the residence of A. C. Crosby; in the East Ward, at Mr. J. McCarthy's Cabinet Shop.

And the following persons are hereby named Acting Returning Officers, and One Cent per centum shall be paid to each of them, for the services performed, that is to say:—For the North Ward, Mr. Thomas Bell; for the South Ward, Mr. John Costello; and for the East Ward, Mr. Robert Montgomery.

VII. That this By-Law shall take effect and come into operation on the Twenty-fourth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.
