A BY-LAW TO RAISE BY WAY OF LOAN THE SUM OF TWENTY THOUSAND DOL-LARS, FOR THE PURPOSES THEREIN MENTIONED.

WHEREAS the Provisional Municipal Council of the County of Victoria have resolved to purchase a Site and erect a Court House and Gaol in the Town of Lindsay, in the County of Victoria, under the provisions of the Act, Twenty-fourth Victoria, Chapter Fifty.

And wheareas, to carry into effect the said recited object, it will be necessary for the said Provisional Municipal Council to raise the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars, in the manner hereinafter mentioned. And whereas it will require the sum of Two Thousand and Two Hundred Dollars, to be

raised annually by special rate, for the payment of the said loan or debt and interest, as also hereinafter mentioned. And whereas the amount of the whole rata ble property of the said Municipality, irrespec-tive of any future increase of the same, and also irrespective of any income to be derived from the temporary investment of the Sinking Fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, according to the last revised Assessment Roll of the said Municipality, being for the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty, was Three Million Three Hundred and Forty-Eight Thousand Eight Hundred and

Eighty-Three Dollars.

And whereas, for paying the interest and creating an equal yearly Sinking Fund for paying the said sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and interest, as hereinafter mentioned, it will require an equal annual special rate of 1-15th part of a Cent on the Dollar, in addition to all rates to be levied in each year.
