The object of that convention was to hear the report of a committee previously appointed to enquire into the capabilities of the district for the production of fax, and, from deductions drawn in the subject, to lay the details before the American Plac Company. One passage in the report of the Committee is full of hopeful anticipation. They state in that document that "the lands of Niagara and the adjoining counties of Erie, Orleans and Genesce, are well adapted to the growth of flax, and that the crop in these counties would be highly remunerative to the farmers. We do not regard it as a peculiarly exhausting crop, and it has the great advantage of keeping the land clean and free from weeds, and is a good crop to seed with, either for Timothy or clover." It further appeared, by the information which had been elected direct from farmers who had been teeting the rect from farmers who had been testing the powers of the soil in the growth of flax, that the average yield had been a ton and a half of threshed straw, and, of seed, ten bushels to the acre; but, in several instances, there had been two tons of straw and eighteen bushels of seed given as the acreable yield.

BY-LAW TO RAISE BY WAY OF LOAN THE SUM OF TWENTY THOUSAND DOL-LARS, FOR THE PURPOSES THEREIN MENTIONED.

WHEREAS the Provisional Municipal Council of the County of Victoa Court House and Gaol in the Town of ndsay, in the County of Victoria, under the ovisions of the Act, Twenty-fourth Victoria,

Lindsay, in the County of Victoria, under the provisions of the Act, Twenty-fourth Victoria, Chapter Fifty.

And wheareas, to carry into effect the said recited object, it will be necessary for the said Provisional Municipal Council to raise the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.
