BRILLIANT CAVALRY ATTACK.

Momphie, June 15. The following is from the Vicksburg News of the 12th : We learn that the Confederates last week resented the New Orleans, Opelousus and Great Western Bailroad from the enemy, taking several officers and privates prisoners and destroying all the bridges on the road. Our men thou ran the train to Algiers, and cut the lever to prevent the enemy getting out, but ther soon repaired it.

They plundered and burned several vessels in the Pamunkey Hiver, awaaped down on a huge waggon train, and, it is said, burned a forage train of full sixty wasgons, and killed a number of tonnators. It is said the marauders were Stonewall Jackson's; this active rebel General's army has wholly escaped Fremont, and is now on our flank, so the country people north of us say, and I believe it to be true.

HATTLE NEAR CHARLESTON.


