Fort Monroe, Aug. 11.—In regard to the occupation and evacuation of Malvern Hill, by the Federal troops, little has been said.

Our reconnoitering division took pessession on Tuesday, and on that day all the Generals of the army went up, and Gen. McClellan sent back for the greater part of his army, but the messengers took the wrong road, and thus delayed so long that the troops did not reach Malvern Hill until it was too late, and only a portion of those sent for arrived at all, and those only in season to beat a hasty retreat. This was on Wednesday moruing, and on that day a great battle would have been fought, had our forces arrived in season, but as some of them were approaching in sight of Malvern Hill, there was a very large force of rebels seen coming from Hichmond, numbering at least 100,000 men, filling all the roads, passage ways, and vacant lots as lar as the eye could reach. A retreat was consequently made to Harrison's Landing which Gen McClellan had planned for a great battle, but the enemy were not asleep, and have taken enemy were not asleep, and have taken possession of Malvern Hill with an immense

THREE MORE IRON RAMS. THE BLOCKADE OF CHARLESTON AND SAVANNAH TO BE RAISED.

GREAT FRIGHT OF THE FEDERALS (Correspondence of the N. Y. Times.)

On board the Vermont, Port Royal Harbor, S.C., Saturday, Aug. 2, 1862. We have reliable information that the two rams in Charleston harbor are nearly if not quite ready for service, and will be used mainly to protect the harbor, and convey vessels out and in through the blockading fleet. They are small, however, though formidable, and can hardly be used to advantage or with safety at any great distunce from the shore. They have conical revolving turrets, an improvement on the Monitor, and these turrets and their sides are cased with railroad iron, mainly sent down from the railroads which the Rebels have

destroyed in their different retreats through The great ram which now threatens us from Savannah is of very different proportions, being the Scotch steamer Fingal, razeed and thoroughly mailed (the Secesh claim that she at Kelly's Tavern is shot-proof against our heaviest guns), with railroad iron brought down from Chattanooga, Atlanta, and the other main depots of railroad siness in Georgia. It is claimed for her that she is perfectly seaworthy, her heavy guns being mounted on elevating platforms, which can be lowered to the bottom of her hold, soven feet below her water-line, when she is at sea. These guns are raised by means of screws when she is prepared for action, and are said to number fourteen—two 120-pounders, rilled; four 50-pounders, rilled; six 10-inch columbiads, made at the Tredegar Iron Works; and two brass 24-pounder howitzers to sweep the fore and aft parts of her deck in case of her being boarded, and to be used to sweep the fore and aft parts of her deck in case of her being boarded, and to be used with grape and canister against any vessel

that may grapple with this marine destroyer. The time has come when we must talk plainly or perish. The navy cannot plead, if ank or smashed up into match timber, that i has won a "strategic victory," and that i has succeeded in its dearest and most necessary wish when driven, routed, orippled and dis abled before a conquering enemy.

It should be known far and wide, that the

fleet on which such lavish eulogies have been bestowed, and which, by its important action in capturing the rebel ports in this harbor, first raised and revived the drooping spirits of the North after months of continued disaster and blundering on the part of the land forces; that this fleet, so important in itself, and so absolutely essential to the general safety of Gen. Hunter's entire army, is now exposed to the attack of the engines of destruction against which it has no adequate means of defence.

And with the destruction of the navy, should such be accomplished, the Rebels will, in all human probability, be enabled to wrest back from us every foot of ground now under the shelter of the Union flag in the states of South Carolina and Georgia. The small force left with Gen Hunter, further and largely reduced of late, in order to furnish renewed legions to fill the burial trenches and choke up the hospitals of the Virginia Peninsula, can scarcely supe for any length of time, to resist the masses of Secession troops now held in readiness on the mainland opposite Port Royal and Hilton Head Islands. If once the ram succeeds in crushing our gunboats, the Secesh will have obtained an unmolested crossing for the rafts and barges which they are known to have been busily building of late in every creek, bayon and streamlet along the mainland shore; and then farewell to the gallant soldiers of the Department of the South.
