THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

It is now understood that the South proposes a hard settlement. The North shall recognize the States' right of secession, which they claim is to be found in resolutions of 1793, written by Jefferson. They then return fugitives from labor or pay their value to their owners.

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

Louisville, Oct. 24. Those who have styled the battle of Perryville a Union success are sadly mistaken. It was a terrible and wholly fruitless waste of life and property. Officials returns from all the divisions engaged show an aggregate loss of 85,000 killed, 2,885 wounded, and nearly 500 missing and prisoners.

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

The rebels abandoned them in a disabled condition on Thursday morning, excepting two Napoleon guns, in place of which they left two smooth bore 6 pounders. After a careful investigation, I have become satisfied that the rebel loss did not exceed two-thirds of our loss. Between 600 and 700 of their dead were buried by us, and about 1,300 wounded remained on our hands.

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
