

DEATH OF THE HEAVIEST MAN IN
NEW YORK.

John Jefferson Shelley, the well-known coachman for the United States Hotel, died yesterday at his residence, No. 48 Park-avenue, from consumption. Deceased was probably the fattest man in the city, and was a notorious character around him, and had a circumference that surpasses his height, and was so enormous that it was difficult to imagine what a struggle he must have had to travel throughout the country with his enormous troupe. At his death Shelley weighed over five hundred pounds. About two months ago he proved to be five hundred and nine pounds weight, but at the time of his death he was lighter by a few pounds. Mrs. Shelley, who was examined by Dr. Naumann, testified that her husband commenced to grow fat about eight years ago, and that he gradually increased in weight until it was with difficulty that he could breathe. About three years ago, deceased had a very severe attack of sickness, which reduced him considerably; but as soon as he was entirely recovered, he gained fat more rapidly than ever, and finally became such a monster that his friends called Barlow's attention to the matter, and he was placed on exhibition. Shelley was thirty-nine years of age, and was a native of Hartford, Conn. He had an excellent character for sobriety and industry, and leaves his wife in comfortable circumstances. Dr. Wooster Beach, who made a post mortem examination of the body, gave it as his opinion that death was caused by "saturation, the result of excessive adhesive deposits throughout the system," and the jury rendered a verdict accordingly.—*N. Y. Times*.

SAD ACCIDENT.—As the accommodation train going West started from the station yesterday noon, the newsboy of the train, in trying to get on the cars while in motion, lost his balance and fell between the passenger and the conductor's car, and was killed instantaneously, the wheel of the passenger car crossing over his shoulders. He had not been long on the cars, and was not used to getting on, while they were in motion. Carelessly catching hold of the railing with only one hand, having the other laden with books, he had got his foot on the lower step but could not balance himself, swinging around between the cars and letting go his hold as he did so, from a diary found on his person his name was ascertained to be O. D. Beebe, lately of the 14th Michigan Volunteers Company E. He had been in service, but was taken sick, sent to the hospital, and discharged on the 18th of September last. An inquest was held on the body, by Dr. Donnelly, when the Jury brought in a verdict in accordance with the above facts.—*Chatham Planet*.
