able news of the occupation of Puebla I Havana by the British mail steamer.

Orlege, on the 18th, offered to surrender on condition that the sudders be allowed to carry their banners and the officers their side arms, and all to make to Mexico and report to the Supreme Government. These were granted, except the latter, Gen. Forey ordering them to march to Orizaba, and there await in inactivity the close of the war.

On the 18th Gen. Forey presented the officere a document to sign, declaring that they will not mix in the politice of the nation, and they will become neutral during the war, that they will not leave the limits to be assigned by the French General in Chief, and that they will not communicate with any one without his consent. The officers received this with cries of "Long live Mexico?" "Death to Napoleon III?" "Death to the traitors?"—and then signed a protest that they were not allowed to sign the above by the laws of their country, or by military honour.

President Juarez had issued a proclamation announcing the great disaster of the surrender of Puebla, and stating that not only will the capital be defended to the last extremity, but that all other places will be defended with vigour; that the nation will wage war without ceasing and under all sacrifices against the odious army which is profaming its soil.
