PERPETUAL MOTION.-The Kingston British American says Mr. C. Carruthers, a mechanic, of the Grand Trunk Railway, has after ten years of thought and labor, discovered the principle of perpetual motion. The model is constructed of eight levers, and each of these levers has a weight attached to it. Seven of these weights are descending while one is ascending.
