"HARD LABOR" TO BE SUPPLIED.—The Mayor has announced his intention of having a very large grinding stone erected in the Market square, on a platform, where those sentenced to hard labor will be allowed to exercise themselves in sharpening axes, grates for all who supply them. This will be carried out, and will prove extensively beneficial to those who have been the habit of counting "430 days in jail" when they had no where else to go.

POPULATION OF THE UNITED STATES.—The population of the United States, Northern and Southern, is given in a recently published blue-book, in the report by Mr. Stuart, Secretary of the Department of the Interior at Washington. It states that the population of the States and Territories is estimated as amounting in 1860 to 31,446,089, showing an increase of 8,250,000 over the return of 1850, while the population in 1790 only amounted to 3,929,827. No State has decreased in population, whilst Illinois has more than double its population during the last decade. Of the entire population, 4,441,765 are colored persons; and of these 488,095 are free. The excess of males over females in the United States is estimated to amount to about 730,000, caused chiefly by the greater influx of male emigrants from Europe. The minimum of slaves appears to have been in the year 1850, amounting to 3,200,000, and since that time the number liberated has amounted in those years respectively to 3945, or one to every 1369, or against 1467, or one to every 2181. The number of slaves who escaped from their masters amounted to only 803 in 1861, against 1011 in 1850.

THE FRENCH MURDER CASE.—Frick has been found guilty of the murder of Elizabeth York, at Kingston. It will be remembered that in a fit of jealousy he assailed her on the public road and beat her brains out, first with a stone and then with a club. He heard the verdict with the utmost cheerfulness.

DESERTERS FROM YANKEELAND.—A great many young men are coming to Canada to escape serving in the Northern Armies. Those who have been regularly enrolled, and have sworn to serve, should be looked upon as forsworn, and not encouraged or trusted. But others who escape to prevent themselves from committing unnecessary homicide, ought to be treated differently. It is, however, hard to distinguish. What is a drafted man to do? To defend his country? Not at all. He is asked to take up arms in a domestic feud, the justice of which he may not admit. To go into a land, where he may have blood relations or intimate friends, and there to kill and destroy, at the risk of his own life. No wonder so many are leaving such a country and fleeing to a land of freedom, law and justice.—Kingston Whig.

HOW THOMAS FERGUSON WAS SOLD.—Quebec was convulsed on Saturday by a practical joke played on Friday night. Mr. McGinnis, of the Dear and Dumb Axiom, having stated that it was impossible to communicate any abstract ideas to the prisoner, a jury was formed out of the persons in Court to decide upon the points. After hearing the evidence of the father and of Mr. McGinnis, the jury returned the following verdict: On the points submitted to them:— 1. That the prisoner stands, simple, not out of malice, but by the visitation of God. 2. That the prisoner is unable to plead. 3. That the prisoner is insane, and unable to make a proper defence.
