THE GREAT FIGHT IN ENGLAND.

The choice of ground was won by Heenan and exactly at 10 o'clock on the morning of the 10th inst., the men were delivered at the

Bell's Life concludes its description of the fight in the following words, "A braver contest was never fought." Rumours had been current that Heenan was

in an alarming condition in consequence of the punishment he received in his recent fight with King, but they proved to be unfounded.

On the arrival of Heenan in London he received the best medical assistance, and although his bruises and contusions were found to be his bruses and contusions were found to be very severe, none of his bones were broken, and he had received no internal injury. His head exhibited the most ghastly appearance; his old lip wound had re-epened and his eyes had nearly closed.

The bets on the result of the fight surpass

in their number any ever made on any like occasion. The papers give elaborate accounts of the fight, and King's victory was naturally received with great exultation. There was no interruption of the fight, and it was bravely,

fairly and equally fought.

The London Times devotes a leader to the affair, and also publishes a graphic special account. It editorially says that Heenan was game throughout, from the beginning to the close of the fight, and he put the hug on so as to crush his antagonist by dashing him to the ground. King's tactics were more creditable as a professor of pugilism. They consisted simply in striking a series of sledge-hammer blows on the most prominent parts of Heenan's physiognomy, until the latter collapsed from exhaustion. There appears to have been little science on either side, but it was nevertheless a fair stand-up fight without a strictly stand part of the public.
