## AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

Headquarters, Army of the  
Potomac, Jan. 6.Nothing of interest is transpiring. All are  
endeavouring to keep comfortable.The enrolment of citizens in this army is  
nearly completed, including whites and blacks.  
The number subject to draft will be very con-  
siderable.New York, Jan. 5.—The Times' special  
Washington announces that the whole matter  
of exchange of prisoners is to be confined to  
Gen. Butler's hands, and that all the prisoners  
in our possession to the number of 300,000  
are to be assembled at Point Lookout.Leavenworth, Jan. 4.—Advices from the  
South say a fight occurred on the 18th, near  
Fort Gibson, in the Cherokee country, between  
1,000 Rebels, under Quantral and Col. Phillips,  
of the Indian Brigade. The fight lasted  
several hours and resulted, in the complete de-  
feat of the Rebels, who scattered in all direc-  
tions, leaving 50 killed and wounded on the
