The very great consumptive demand in the States, not only prevented any of their crop from reaching our market; but attracted the bulk of choice Canada Flours, at rates which shippers here could not pay. The crop of Spring Wheat in Canada West last year was deficient in quantity, while that of Fall Wheat and of coarser grains were a fair average, and they were all in good demand at fair prices for U. S. markets. From these causes, the receipts of Flour at this port which were, up

From these causes, the receipts of Flour at this port which were, up to the month of July, in excess of last season, from that point steadily declined, and closed the year 4,000 barrels less than 1862. Since harvest, Superfine only varied in value from \$4 to \$4.30; and while operators have had no margin for large proffits, it is generally understood that the Fall trade has been, in the main, satisfactory to millers, dealers and shippers. The latter on account of the Wheat, both of 1862 and 1863, was very good; and Canadian Flour has maintained a high relative value in all markets where it has been sold ; and in British markets especially, Canadian Wheat and Flour have been in demand for the purposes of mixing with their own grain—more or less out of condition.
