THE FORGED PROCLAMATION.

Two of the morning papers of this city are to-day suspended. It is done in corsequence of the publication yesterday in the Journal of Commerce and The World of the forged proclamation, and, we presume, elsewhere a letter from the proprietors of the Journal of Commerce, with an article which was to have been printed in that paper this morning. It is, we know, a truthful statement of the facts. The forged proclamation was sent to every paper of the Associated Press, except our own, and in such a shape as to lead those who receive t it to believe it came from the office of the Association. It was sent, designedly no doubt, when it was presumed that it would be seen by none of the editors but would be taken by the printers and hurried into a part of the morning edition of each paper, the printers having no time to examine it, even if they were disposed to take the responsibility, of what seemed to be an important proclamation, and to have come by an authorized absence. ized channel. That it did not find its way to this office was probably an accident—the editorial rooms being closed, and the messenger, perhaps, not knowing how to find his way to the rinting office - and to this accident it is due that it was not published in two other morning papers. In both those offices it became known—by the merest accident in one of them, and by inquiry in the other-that we had not received it, and suspicion being excited by that fact, the forged document, though in type, was suppressed in both offices.

The forgery was as ingenious, as to the methed of its circulation, though clumsy in its style, as it was bold and w'cked. It was intended, no doubt, to affect the stock market, as well as to nulify the influence of the news of Grant's successes, to be taken out by the steamer yesterday. It failed signally in the latter purpose, as it was accompanied by an official denial of its truth. In Wallstreet it was not without its influence, where

no lie is so big that it cannot be swallowed. The real facts which led to the publication of this monstrous fo gery, were not, we presume, known yesterday in Washington. or the suspension of the two journals would not, we suppose have been ordered. The order, no doubt, will be revoked to-day. hope it will, for certainly no journal should be punished for a mistake which might have very it nocently been committed by the mest loyal paper in the land.— Tribune.
