No public man in Europe, except perhaps Garibaldi, has more consistently and more estentatiously insisted on the right of every nationality to dispose of its own destiny. Nothing could be more clear, according to this theory, than that the Danes should be at liberty to resume such relations to the German Confederation as they may see fit. Aut because this would not be for the interest of Louis Napoleou, he at once abandous his most favorite ulea and falls back upon the old doct, no of Macchia-vellian diplomatists of Europe concerning the balance of power, which, if he mouth of any of the Great Powers, simply means an opposition to any acheme of changing the map of Europe by which its own position would become a less favorable one.

In another respect the offer of the Danish Government is of importance to a proper understanding of European politics. It forestandows the fate of all the small countries. Even if they were entirely let alone by their powerful neighbors, they must soon find it for their interest to seek a closer union with those more powerful States with which they have most in common. Union movements of this kind are already beginning to make themselves felt in every small country of Europe, and the example set by the Danish Government is sure to find many imitators.
