

then adjudge to the highest bidder, provided, however, that no bid shall be received or accepted at such Auction, from any person who is not, in the opinion of the Mayor, fit and competent to discharge the duties of Market Clerk, or who shall not have previously tendered, names of two good and sufficient sureties, willing to be liable for the due performance of the contract, and the faithful payment, Quarterly in advance, of the proportion of such amount as may be required for such Tolls and Charges; but the first sale of the above Tolls and Charges shall be held by the said Town Clerk at the said hour and place, on the 1st day of November instant, and shall be continued, until the first Monday of December, the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

15. That the purchase of the Tolls, &c., as aforesaid, shall, if approved of by the Mayor, and the consent of the Council of the said Town, and his duties shall be:—

1. To open and close the Market House on market days at the regular market hours, and be in attendance at the market during said hours.
2. To exercise a general superintendence over the affairs of the said market, and see that the Butcher's stalls, stands, and the stalls for other goods, are kept clean and orderly, and that the passages through the market are kept clear.
3. To see that the stalls and stands are regularly in the market, and place all vehicles coming into the market place; he shall arrange the stands of market goods and other retailers, and assign places for the standing and sales of horses, cattle, sheep, swine and other animals.
4. He shall, as far as possible, prevent all means, fish and provisions offered for sale in said market, and see that any that may be tainted or unfit to eat, and shall not purchase animals, provisions, produce, or other articles at the said market, for himself or another, to be sold, or shall he act as an agent in such case for any one else.
5. He shall have charge of the scales and measures belonging to the market, and shall be entitled to demand and receive from all persons selling, or offering for sale, any thing at the said market, the fees hereinafter enumerated, and none other.
6. He shall perform his duties in a civil and obliging manner, and see that the provisions of this By-Law are respected; and he shall enter a complaint with the Mayor of any infraction of this By-Law made within his knowledge.
7. He shall be a Constable of the said Town, and an officer of the Council, and he shall not appoint a substitute, nor absent himself from the market for a longer period than twenty-four hours without proper permission, and shall, before entering the duties of his office, take and subscribe the necessary declaration.
10. That in case of the resignation or death of the said Market Clerk, or should he prove unfit or incompetent to discharge the duties of his office, or should he absent himself without leave, the Council may immediately appoint in his stead, any person giving the necessary security, and on payment of such sum as may be required for the Market Tolls and Charges, shall be Market Clerk for the unexpired term of his predecessor.
17. That the following Market Tolls and Charges, and none other, shall be imposed and collected under this By-Law, viz:—

For each load of hay and weighing 20 cwt.	12
For each load of straw and weighing 12 cwt.	12
For each vehicle with provisions, produce or other things for sale, except wheat or wood, drawn by two horses or other animals	7
For each vehicle with provisions, &c., as above, with one horse.	5
For every stand or table not exceeding five feet in length per day for stand.	4
For the stand for every barrel, box, hand cart or wheelbarrow.	3
For every basket, pail, or other such package not hereinafter provided for.	2
For every horse, mare, bull, cow or steer for sale, except on fair days.	6
For every calf, sheep, pig, calf, lamb (unless in vehicles).	3

18. That the following shall be the Weighing Charges, viz:—

For weights below 50 lbs. (or not over 50 lbs.)	1 cent.
For weights over 50 lbs. to 150 lbs.	2
For weights over 150 lbs. to 300 lbs.	3
For weights over 300 lbs. to 500 lbs.	5

For every weight of hay and straw weighed on the hay scales, for the first five cwt., 10 cents, and one cent for every additional cwt.

For every cord of wood measured. 3 |

19. That the following articles shall be exempt from Toll, viz: Wheat, Firewood, Hides and Skins, and Wool; but if these articles are offered for sale, or sold elsewhere in the said Town than in the said Market Place (unless as hereinafter provided) the person so selling or offering them for sale shall be subject to the penalty imposed for the infraction of this By-Law, together with a charge for Toll.

20. That Public Fairs shall be held in the said market Quarterly on the Third Wednesday in the respective months of March, June, September, and December in each year, in accordance with the proclamation heretofore issued by the Governor General of this Province to that effect.

That the said Town Council may from time to time make such rules and regulations for the government of such market and fair, not inconsistent with the other provisions of this By-Law, as they may deem necessary.

22. That any person guilty of an infraction of this By-Law, or any of the provisions thereof, or who shall neglect or refuse to pay the Market Clerk any of the Tolls, Fees or Charges enumerated in this By-Law, which such person ought to pay, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding Ten Dollars and costs, to be recovered according to law.
