"The captain denounces the rascality the Consul in violating the faith of his word given to the President, namely, that no act of hostility would be attempted against the Florida in this port.

From another source it has been learned that on shore great excitement existed from the capture of the Florida; and it being reported that the American Consul, Mr. Wilson, had given his word that no attempt would be made in port to take the Florida. his alleged want of faith led a mob to gather about his house, who smashed the windows and forced the Consul to quit the city. The riot lasted some time, but on the obje popular antipathy getting out of the way it subsided. The part of the crew of the Florida, some fifty to seventy men, and Captain Morris, may have had a hand in the riot; at least the sailors had, it is likely, for they were 'on liberty,' and were, of course, more or less drunk. It is to be presumed that Captain Morris had too much sense to incite a riot, though in his protest to the Brazilian Government he speaks bitterly of the broken word of the Consul."

GENERAL SHERMAN'S MOVEMENT.

The uncertainty as to General Sherman's exact destination is not yet cleared up, but sufficient is known to enable us to understend that his unde taking is one of the very gravest importance. According to the moreliable accounts, he left Atlanta on the 11th instant, with a force of 60,000 men, provided with 60 days' rations, and took up his line of march towards the sea-coast. It was announced that he was to touch at Macon, and probably at Milledgeville. Those towns lie to the southeast of Atlanta, and in capturing them Gen. Sherman would be able to cut the railway system of Georgia and the South at very important points. A writer in the World conjectures that a part of his force had been sent to the south-west to make an attack upon Montgomery. The movement to the south-cast is very generally interpreted to mean an attack upon Savannah or Charleston, while others have conjectured that ultimately Mobile, which lies to the sonth-east of Atlanta, would be General Sherman's destination. The rumoured movement towards Montgomery and the presence of a Federal fleet at Mobile bay, may be cited as evidence that the latter conjecture is right, but the balance of rumour is immeasurably in favor of the idea that the real movement is towards Charleston or Savannah.
