

REWARD OFFERED.—The Grand Trunk Railway Company has a reward of \$500 for the apprehension and conviction of the person or persons who placed the ties on track below Mr. Coleman on the night of the 24th inst., by which a freight train was partially derailed from the track. The reward was captured and thrown into the ditch, but fortunately no one was seriously injured.

LYNX SHOT IN DELAWARE TOWNSHIP.—We learn from a correspondent that on Saturday last, a party of three, Mr. W. Home Flood, his brother, and another gentleman, while hunting in the woods, in the vicinity of Delaware township, killed a fine lynx. The animal measured three feet six inches from the nose to the end of the body, and was about twenty-six inches in height. When discovered, the dog having run him pretty hard, the party were loaded with pigeon shot only, and after three discharges the lynx jumped down among the dogs, who immediately seized him. The sportsman then fired, and eventually disabled him to death, not before he had disabled two of the dogs.

REPORTED DISCOVERY OF A MURDER COMMITTED 27 YEARS AGO.—A correspondent of the Hamilton Times, writing from Stratford, on Thursday, says: "There is a great excitement here at present in consequence of a confession made by a hostler, relative to a murder which was committed twenty-seven years ago. He states that at the time a pedlar and his wife, and the daughter of the latter, were in the employ of the hostler at the time, but disappeared shortly after leaving his horse and effects, which were sold. The pedlar had been murdered in a well, and his body was conveyed to a well, and there thrown in. Since that time things have changed—the tavern has been burned, and on its site, covering the well, is a large brick store; the landlord is dead, and the widow has since married, and occupies a respectable position in society. The servant girl, too, who witnessed the murder and confessed the secret to the hostler—is dead, and he could not consent to the discovery of the deed longer, as it preyed upon his mind and almost crazed his brain. He makes a solemn affidavit to these facts; thus people do not know what to believe. The affair is mysterious in the extreme though many old inhabitants distinctly remember the disappearance of the party. The matter will, of course, undergo further investigation."

REMARKABLE MINERAL DISCOVERY.—The existence of an immense iron mountain at the base of the Iron Range, on the mountain side of the famous iron mountains of Marquette, seems almost too marvellous to believe, yet we can assure our readers upon the most irrefragable testimony that the fact is even so. That such a wonderful mineral deposit should remain undiscovered until a very recent date is the most remarkable feature of the whole affair, and shows how great and diversified is the natural wealth of that world-renowned region, contrasted with the tardy pace of its development, particularly on the Canadian side, where the distance of only about forty-five miles from Sault Ste. Marie this mountain lifts its towering summit to the altitude of about six hundred feet above the level of the lake, being about twice as high as the iron mountains of Marquette. The mine was first discovered a year ago last winter by an Italian named Camillo, who is well known by the sobriquet of "Pevahis," signifying iron. In tapping, he came to a tree that had been blown down, whose upturned roots revealed to view the previously hidden wealth. The news was communicated to a half-breed named Peter Bell, who imparted the secret to M. Mansfield.—*Deloit's Tribune.*

THE ROYAL BABY.—The London Spectator has the following caustic remarks: "The baby is at home again, to the delight, we presume, of all England, and certainly to the immense relief of all newspaper readers. The child landed at Hull, and its arrival produced an outbreak of thinkers beyond even English precedent. The Mayor actually went in his robes to visit a baby not twelve months old, the Sheriff's wife gave him a fur rabbit, which she the reporters, he 'appeared to appreciate,' a vast crowd assembled to see him pass, and 'the milk which supplied the infant prince to the lumber was procured from the Elbow Abbey of Hull,' that dignitary obviously considering the animal likely to be historic. The Queen should put a stop to this kind of folly, which if it continues will lead to sharp retraction against the worship now paid to the Royal family. Already in a journal, which we are glad to see is the only one which would blow gently on a tree because the Queen had planted it, is indulged in pretty sharp satire, and aldermen who now buy cows because they feed Royal babies will soon be ashamed of caring about the babies themselves. It will not do to let the English people raise their princely idols; they always break them at the end."
