

A CLERGYMAN BESIEGED IN HIS HOUSE.

A QUER STATE OF AFFAIRS.
It is very seldom that the clergymen of Canada place themselves in a position so humiliating and disgraceful as that in which an Episcopal clergyman of this country has placed himself, for, as a rule, they endeavor to practice that which they preach, and while advocating obedience to laws Divine and human, seldom set both at defiance, particularly the latter. Occasionally the clergyman will hoist a window, and invite the bailiffs to accept of some refreshments, when he will hand the articles out of the window, and the parties will enter into a pleasant conversation over the state of affairs. If the position of the clergyman was the result of a mistake, one might extend their pity to him, but it is not. Not only does he obtain goods without a reasonable prospect of paying for them, but he has managed to disgust every member of his congregation, and some of the most unseemly quarrels have been the result. The proper authorities should enquire into the circumstances, and settle the dispute in some satisfactory manner.—*St. Catharines Journal.*

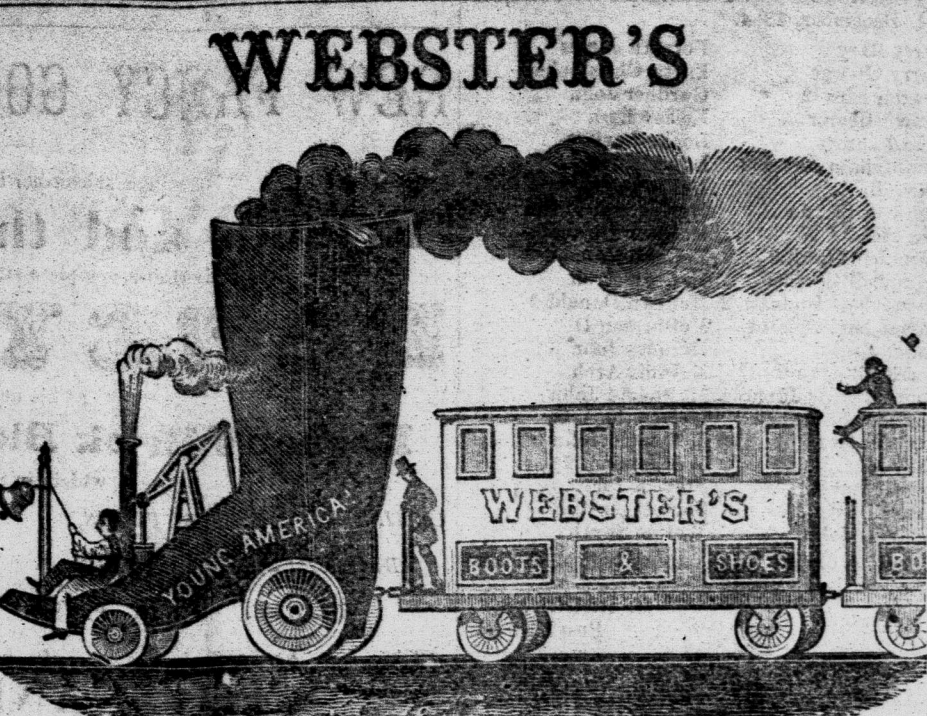
