This is the right of every name should strive to win, and when won, are many yet for whom it has to be won . but thank God none on British soil. May the day soon come when accursed slavery shall perish everywhere, and no man shall hinder another to do the best he can for himself. Americans boast of their freedom -I admire much that exists among our neighbours; but freedom to perpetrate wrong upon our fellow man with impunity is not freedom, it is licentiousness-it is freedom run mad-and we fear that this kind of freedom prevails too much among our neighbours. As for Religious liberty, I maintain every man has a right to worship as he pleases so far as any other man is concerned. I may by expressing disapprobation, by using argument and persuasion seek to restrain a man from worshipping in a way I think wrong : but I have no right to do so by using violence.
