TO WARM POTATOES.—Potatoes are best done in the following way: Par-boil as many potatoes as may be needed; let them lie till next morning; then cut them in small squares; add to them cream or milk, enough to make them more than moist, with a little butter, and pepper and salt. Place on the fire, cover them, and stir gently at times.

INDIAN LOAF CAKE.—One pint of Indian-meal; 1 do. of flour; 1 do. sour milk; half tea-cup molasses; half cup shortening; a tablespoonful soda; a little salt. Put in a two-quart basin, set in a steamer over a kettle of boiling water; let it steam half an hour, take out, place in an oven, bake half or three quarters of an hour.

Governor Andrews in his annual message calls attention to the excess of women in Massachusetts, and to the surplus of men in Oregon, California, and other remote western communities. In Oregon, having 52,160 inhabitants, according to the census of 1860, there were 17,961 males over sixteen years old, and only 9878 females above that age. Its population is now estimated at over 100,000, this disproportion still remaining. In Massachusetts there were 527,833 males between the ages of fifteen and forty, and 287,000 females, or a surplus of 29,166. The excess the Governor says of women of all ages over fifteen years was 38,846. The absorption of men by the military and naval service during the intervening four years has aggravated this disproportion. And it is a disastrous one; it disorders the market for labor; it reduces men and women to an unnatural competition for employment fitted for men alone; it tends to augment the number of both men unable to maintain families, and women who must maintain themselves unaided. In civilized and refined society, it is the duty of man to protect woman, to furnish her a sphere, a support, a home. In return for this she comforts, refines, and adorns domestic life, the family, and the range of social influences. This is also the plainly providential order. Where women are driven to the competition with men, or where men are left unsolaced and unrefined by the presence of woman, society is alike weakened and demoralized. He recommends the adoption of some practical way in which young women may be enabled to emigrate to useful fields of employment in the Western States.

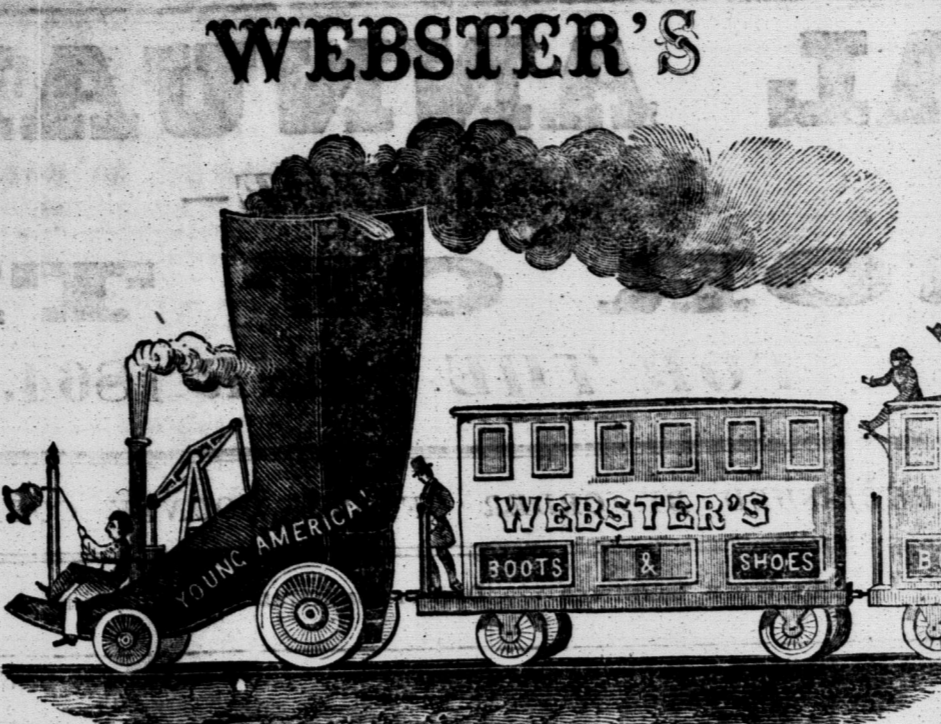
