As the Confederates have evi dently determined to make a stand on the line of the Atlantic and North Carolina railway, and failing that, on the Roanoke river, one of the most important series of battles of the war will probably soon take place, es pecially as the junction of Sher man's Schofield's and Grant's forces, to say nothing of Sheridan's command, in the country bet ween and along the Roanoke and Chowan rivers on the boundary line of Virginia would involve the abandonment of the lines of Petersburg and the protable evacuation of hichmond. The next few days-a week at latest-may, therefore, probably bring news of a most important character, and probably witness one of the turning points of the war. The armies in the field, with the exception of the force at Mobile, are all moving on Richmond, and should they get within supporting distance of each other, the fall of Richmond will not be very far distant. In writing these few lines, we are, of course, unaware of the strength and disposition of the Confederate forces, information of this nature having been withheld for some time past, for obvious reasons. But from the information which has come, the situation seems to be in favor of the Federals.
