Each disputant appoints "his friend," whom he fully expects to look wholly to his interests, to object to everything that bears against him, and to consent to nothing that would prejudice him, and the trend so appointed is generally too ready to do all this most faithfully.

Numerous instances have occurred, and are occurring among us, of the strange misconception that prevails. Arbitrators are heard talking of "their clients," meaning those who named him; just as the lawyer speaks of the person who retained his services. Men in good social position, who would be highly indignant at the imputation of dishonesty or ignorance, so to speak, of what is worse, so as on arbitrations, no seeking even to discuss, their advocacy of their client's interests and yet beyond all shadow of doubt such men are either wholly ignorant of their duties or too dishonest to regard their proper performance.
