It is no exaggeration to say, that at the present moment there is in Canada Three Millions' of Dollars worth of lumber and timber prepared for the United States market. This is a very large "lock up" of capital, and in no small degree contribute to the general strangency of money. Its movement to a market cannot fail therefore to impart ease. Fortunately, the prospects of a good demand and a profitable price tre excellent, not only owing to the low rate
