This large decrease cannot fail to have a most important effect. This marked decrease is the best indication of a prompt and decided disposition on the part of the people to practise a large economy, for which there was never a greater necessity than at present. The Montreal Witness further remarks on

the same subject: The above table shows such a diminution of importation that stocks must soon, even with a diminished demand, be greatly reduced. The great deficiency is in dry goods, and though we have no means of ascertaining the amount manufactured in the country, it must be considerably less than for the corresponding period of the previous year, on account of some factories having been altogether shut, and others working only par-tially. The stock in retail stores throughout the country cannot be very heavy, as the purchases made by country merchants last fall were generally very light; and though economy and wearing old clothes are now generally the order of the day, jet there is a limit to that process. The more thoroughly clothes are worn out the more thorough must be the renewal when it comes, and the greater the impetus to business. The great aim should be to avoid overtrading in future.
