The school teacher who desires anything like success in his labor as an instructor must not (at the same time that he is a teacher,) be a farmer, a mechanic, or a doctor. In nine cases out of ten, where this rule is violated, the time which should be devoted to one kind of work is spent at anis done. A school-master must be punctual himself if he would have his pupils so, and it is all but impossible to be at a given place at a stated hour twice a day for five days in the week, when the cares of other pursuits occupy a share of attention. Besides this, every teacher knows what a great thing it is to give his undivided attention to his work during the six hours he is employed in actual teaching. How can an instructor who has the cares of a township clerk, for example, attend to his work as a teacher without being interrupted, since such clerk may at any time of any teaching day be called upon by some officer or ratepayer?

It may be asked are there teachers so engaged in Canada? I answer there are; although I am glad to say that I am not aware of an instance of this kind in Victoria county. A test question for every candidate for a license to teach school might be,-" Were

THE EXAMINATION OF MISS KENT-INTERVIEW BE TWEEN FATHER AND CHILD.
