Miscellaneous. CURIOSITIES FROM SIAM.

The Siamese Government, through Rev. Dr. House, American missionary to Bangkok, has requested from the United States Mint a list of plans and specifications for the machinery necessary to produce coin in the perfection of that of the United States.

The double tical is their largest silver coin, and their smallest is about the size of a duckshot, in value about three and a half cents. The present to the mint includes a set of these nuggets, and a set of the new style of money, which is really a handsome coin. Accompanying them was a photograph of the master of the royal mint. When the British Government made its treaty with Siam it sent to the King many presents. A photograph apparatus was among them. The King of Siam has a son who must be a young man of rare accomplishments. He soon learned to use the apparatus, and the carte in question was taken by him.

The name of the master of Siam mint is Pra Wisut Yetomaud. He is a noble. His autograph, as above, is written by himself in American characters on the back of the card. Accompanying it are two large photographs, one representing the King, and the other representing the heir apparent to the throne—a boy about nine years old. These pictures are taken in a manner that would do no discredit to the finest artist in Chesnut street. The master of the mint is dressed in a "wamus," and short legged trousers, looking much like a man-of-war's sailor. His feet are bare. In that country a suit of white-wash answers about as good a purpose as a suit of cassimere.

The King is taken in a wheeled chair, with an elaborate marble-topped table on either side of him, covered with articles of vertu. He wears jeweled garments, and a sword that appears to be liberally incrust with gems. The Prince is crowned, and attired even more gorgeously than his father. He is a handsome faced boy, and the picture is evidently a good one. Governour Pollock is now having prepared the specifications that the Siamese Government ask for, and they will be forwarded as early as possible. The King of Siam may as well mention, has the right to two hundred wives. He has, however, only about forty, and his children number about fifty-seven. Dr. House is well received by him, and treated with consideration, but the King is not likely to become a Christian. The white elephant which is upon their new coin is likely to continue to him an object of sanctity.—Philadelphia Gazette
