Bills before the House.

Mr. Ross, M.P.P. for Dundas, has introduced an "Act to facilitate the apprehension and conviction of horse thieves." The crime of horse-stealing is, unfortunately, too prevalent all over the Province, and owing to expense, trouble and loss of time incurred by parties who thus lose their property, as well as the doubtful prospects of success attending a pursuit, the thieves in a large majority of cases make good their escape. The bill before us, should it become law, will make it lawful for the Council of any County Municipality in Upper Canada to provide by by-law that a certain sum shallbe payable as "a reward to any person or "persons who shall pursue and apprehend, "beyond the limits of the County, any per-"son guilty of stealing any horse or mare "within the said County, and such reward "shall be paid out of the Municipality on "conviction of the thief, and on the order of " the Judge before whom the conviction is

Mr. McKellar has introduced a bill to make Reeves and Deputy Reeves elective by a direct vote of the people, and to abolish wards in townships. It has frequently been argued that the present system of electing Reeves and Deputy Reeves was not the best-that it afforded every facility for keeping the most likely men out of these important positions; and that a change, in the direction indicated by this bill, would place it in the power of all the ratepayers of a township to pronounce on the fitness of candidates for these offices. At present the Councillors of a township are in many cases elected in wards, so that the people in each ward only vote for one-fifth of their township Council, and the Reeve and Deputy are then chosen from the five Councillors so elected. Under this system all the ratepayers in a township have not a voice in the election of either their Councillors of Reeves. Petty local jealousy often keeps the best man out of the Council, but even should he be returned, "log-rolling" and other disreputable means may prevent his election to the County Council. We think that Mr. McKellar's bill would be an improvement, and hope that it will become

Mr. Wright, of East York, has introduced a bill imposing the duty upon all Upper Canada townships of levying the following taxes on dogs :- On every bitch 3 months old and upwards, kept by one person or family, \$2; upon every additional bitch, \$5; upon each dog not exceeding two, \$1; and on each dog more than two, \$3. The owner of any dog to be liable for the value of the sheep it kills, and if the owner cannot be found, or canttot pay, the township to be liable. Any person may kill any dog he sees worrying sheep. The owner of any dog and adjoining Counties will find it to their that has worried sheep to be fined 621 cents for every day he allows said dog to live, after notice is served on him.

The ordinary estimates for the financial year ending June 30th, 1866, were brought down by Mr. Galt on Monday afternoon, and do not present any marked difference from those of last year, with the exception that on account of two sessions being held this year, the expenses of the Legislature will be considerably in excess of those of the previous one.

The Amalgamation Bill to incorporate the Buffalo & Lake Huron Railway with the Grand Trunk is before the Railway Committee, and notwithstanding the hostility manifested towards it in Brantford and other places it is said that the promoters of the Bill are determined to press it.

White and Christie on the subject of Annexation—the substance of which was telegraphed to the Leader by the Quebec correspondent of that journal. Mr. O'Halloran said he was not in the habit of boasting of his loyalty, but he had given hostages for his good conduct in the country, and intended to do his duty faithfully. At the same time he would not be deterred, whenever the welfare of Canada demanded that a change in its political relations should take place, from moving an address to Her Majesty, praying that she would allow this Province to take the course best adapted to its well-being.
