"He has Sold Us"

The lacrymose whine which certain Liberal (?) papers have lately assumed when speaking of the present position of the Hon. Messrs. Brown, Macdougall and Howland, plainly shows that there is still a small section of politicians in Canada who cannot see the benefits to be derived from any public measure, unless it be a strictly party one.

Mr. Galt's Financial Statement.

In the House of Assembly, on Tuesday of last week, Mr. Galt submitted the financial statement for the year. In consequence of the alteration of the making up of the accounts from December to June, a review had to be taken of the affairs including eighteen months, and of the twelve months ending June 30th, 1865.

Amendment to the Stamp Act.

It was only last year that Mr. Galt introduced his measure to impose a small tax upon notes of the value of \$100 and over, and in the first fiscal year of its trial the receipts from this source amounted to the large sum of \$119,000.

Let us glance at the colossal grandeur of the two British marines, that of the State and that belonging to citizens in the five continents of the globe. We take the figures, numbers of the globe. Number of sailing ships increased, of 1865:—2,280; tonnage ships, 25,400; 4,655,081 tons; latter ship of 10,000 tons. For the purpose of this merchant fleet, there is a total of 326,365 sailors and mechanics employed. By adding to this force, by naval recruitment, 70,000 military men, for the peace footing of our far-flung marine, we get 596,365 men, without counting the coast guards. No power we had at its disposal such a formidable force in men and material.

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
