Tuesday, the 10th of October, will ever be memorable as the date of the visit of the authorities of Lindsay, Peterborough Part Hope, Cobourg, Brighton and Colborne, to the City of Rochester. The inception and success of the visit is mainly due to the proprietor of the Steamer Coriuthian, Mr. Gildersleeve, who was unceasing in his efforts to have all the arrangements carried out in such a manner us would best conduce to the pleasure and confort of the excursionists.

The Linds y party made an early start on a special train turnished by the Lessees of the Post Hope & Lindsay Rail way, which was under the charge of B. R. Kimbail, Esq., the efficient Superintendent. Port Hope was reached at 8:30 a.m., but although the steamer was ready to-move from her wharf in half an hour after, we did not get under way until 11 o'clock, owing to a mishap on the Peterboro' line which delayed the train for several hours. Eldon Fall Show:

The fourth annual exhibition of the Eldon Branch Agricultural Society was held at Woodville, on Friday, 6th instant.
