DESTRUCTIVE FIRE. The inhabitants of our usually quiet village were somewhat alarmed on Thursday night, the 9th inrt., by the cry of "Fire. and on hurrying to the scene, it was discovered that the stable of Thomas Matchett, Esq., was on fire, and so rapidly did the flames spread-a strong gale blowing at the time-that not even the horses could be rescued from the doomed building. All the outbuildings-a granary containing between three and four bundred bushels of grain, a driving house containing a double carriage, CAMBRAY JOINT STOCK OIL double pleasure steign, cutter, harness, &c., and the stable containing a pair of valuable ponies, five or six tons of hay, &c., - were almost simultaneously in flames, making it impossible to save any of the property except the carriage. It was with the greatest difficulty that his dwelling house, and the buildings occupied by I McNeely, Esq., were saved. All those present worked with a will, and are entitled to the greatest praise for the manner in which they exerted themselves to save property, enduring by turns both heat and cold, as it was freezing keenly at the time. The origin of the fire is mere conjecture, but it cannot be attributed to any other cause than accidental, as few men in this neighborhood are more universally esteemed than Mr. Matchett, and no cause is known to induce an incendiary to commit the act. The loss will exceed \$1,000. The buildings were insured for \$200. The furniture, as is usually the case, in such instances, suffered somewhat in its hasty removal.
