THE COMMERCIAL MISSION

The Montreal Gazette understands that lespatches have been received from the Imperial Government cordially concurring in the measures concerted between the Provincial Governments (originating with our own) respecting the opening up of trade with the West Indies, South and Central American States. The gentlemen appointed on this mission will go armed with full powers from the British Government to negociate treaties for the benefit of these colonies in the name of Her Majesty, to make these arrangements not only with our own sister colonies in the West Indies, but Brazil and perhaps other States. They are expected to sail from England on their mission in the early part of the next month, and to conelude their mirsion in the end of March or early part of April. Mr. Macdougall is at the head of the commission, and the other members are the Hon. Thomas Ryan, M. L. C., of Montreal, and Mr. J. W. Dunscombe, who has been for many years Colector of Customs at the port of Quebec, whose experience acquired in that capacity as well as when he was Commissioner of Customs in former days, will render him a valuable member of the commission. This, of course, explains the cause of Mr. Dunscombe's retirement from the collectorship of Quabec. If no unseen difficulties occur, the whole business is expected to be completed, the information which is gathered by the commissioners laid before the country, and the necessary treaties in force, in good time for next summer's business.
