

The Fenian Prisoners at Brantford.

FIFTY-NINE ARRIVED AND MORE COMING.
THE RECEPTION OF THE CREW BY THE INHABITANTS.

A LIST OF THE INCAGED VAGABONDS.

(From the Hamilton Times Correspondent.)
Brantford, June 4-2.50 p.m.

The illustrious fifty-nine prisoners, now in Brantford goal are doubtless fair types of the Fenian band. A vile crew never left Ireland. They are the scum and scrapings of the slums of every pestilent corner of the adjoining Republic.

Such murderous countenances with such evident Cain marks, and with such villainous looks and features and speech, belong only to the vilest class of out-throats and garrulous.

The pictures in the Police Gazette are handsome and gentlemanly compared with them. Without uniform, with worn out filthy clothes, dyed in the face, some with the Yankee blue cloth, some with worn-out slacks, some bare footed, all of them in the most wretched and miserable plight, they present a spectacle of wretchedness, guilt and sin unsurpassed in the annals of crime. One of them, who preside to be a minister of the gospel, with black robes and white shawl, evidently one of the leaders of the gang. When the prisoners arrived here at 2 p. m. on Sunday morning, the multitude groaned and yelled around them, and called for a rope to hang them.

This would-be-clergyman tried, through one of the Volunteers who guarded him, to address the people, telling them that he was no Fenian; that he sympathized with the Canadians. One of his comrades near said: "Oh, shut up; did't you hire me for a cook?" This revealed gentleman's name is David Forden; age 32; from Edinburgh, Scotland.

The names, ages and places from whence the other Fenians hail, are given below. Among them is a low comic actor from Buffalo, who is very glib in talking about British justice just now.
