Honourably Discharged.

One day last week, Richard Lenihan, a young man employed in a Grocery Store in this town, was arrested under a warrant issued by the Police Magistrate of Toronto, upon a charge of being an accomplice of certain burglars, who had " weeded out" the store of Messrs Page & Sons, of Yonge Street. He was brought by Detective Spence, the officer sent from Toronto, before the Mayor, who after hearing the evidence, did not consider it sufficient to put him on his trial, the facts deposed to being merely that a few pieces of cloth had been found in his possession, which he acknowledged he had received from his brother, a former clerk of Messrs. Page & Sons, who is accused of having obtained them improperly. Notwithstanding the dismissal of the case are respectfully informed that Job Printing by the Mayor, the detective in obedience to instructions brought young Lenihan to Toronto, to be disposed of by the authorities there. His employer, Mr. C. L. Baker, who had always found him an honest, industrious and faithful clerk, very generously retained a lawyer, Geo.
