The advertisement for tenders for debentures premised by Mr. Galt, appeared in the Canada Gazette of Saturday, and is to the effect that applications will be received up to the 10th prox. by the Receiver-Gent's department for the purpose of provincial debentures, to be issued in denominations of \$100 \$200, \$500, and \$1,000, and bear 7 per cent interest, payable half-yearly, and redeemable on the lat Sept., 1868, at the same office, at par. The application must state the rate and respective denominations required by purchasers. Deposit receipts will be given by the Receiver-General countersigned by the misister of Finance, to be held by the purchasers until the debentures are ready for delivery, and the money may be paid into any branch of the Bank of Montreal to the credit of the Receiver-tieneral. Interest will be allowed to purchasers from the date of deposit, if the application is accepted.

Lands Sold for Taxes.

Land-owners will do well to examine the title deeds of their lands before the 18th of September. The Registration Act of 1865, contains a clause in the following terms :

"All doods for lands sold for taxes or onder process of law, before the passing of this Act, shall be registered within one year of the passing of the Act, otherwise the parties respectively claiming under any such sales shall not be deemed to have preserved their priority as against a purchaser in good faith who may have acquired priority of registra-

This Act was assented to on Septembe 18th, 1865 and therefore the time for registration under it expires next month.

Meeting of the Church of England Society and Synod.

Retention of Senior Scholars.

The quarterly session of the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto took place in Turonto on Wednesday the 8th inst. The occasion being on the eve of the annual session of the Diocesian Synod, a large number of the clerical and lay members of the Society were present, and considerable interest was manifested in the proceedings. At ten o'clock the members of the Society, and a number of the congregation of St. James'. attended divine service in the cathedral, where a full choral service was performed. Prayers were intened by the Rev. Dr. Bevan, and the Lessens read by the Rev. Geo. Buil : the Rev. Mr. Allen of Manvers afterwards preaching an able discourse.

At two o'clock the meeting opened in St. George's School House, John Street-the Ven. Archdeacon Bethune in the Chair. The annual report of the financial statement of the Society for the past year was read by the Secretary. The gross amount of receipts was \$24,502 51-the amount of expenditure being \$17,336 65.

The Synod of this Diocese assembled in St. George's Church, Toronto, on Thursday the 9th inst. Previous to that hour the usual morning service was held in the Church. His Lordship the Bishop of Toronto took the chair amidst applause, at the opening of the Synod. There was a very full attendance. The Clerical Secretary, Roy, J. G. Goddes, having called the roll of clerical delegates, the Lay Secretary, Mr. James Bovell, M.D. then called over the names of the several parishes and their representatives. The Bishop subsequently delivered a most elequent address, which we regret we cannot

make room for in these columns. A spirited discussion arose regarding the election of a Condiutor Bishop - a smell minerity being in favour of placing the nomination in the hands of the English bench of bishaps, should the result of the ballot in the Synod show a majority of votes favourable to this course ; but this was overruled, as it was held to be ridiculous for the Synod to delegate the powers given it by Parliament. and it was at length resolved that the election of a Coadjutor Bishop should take place on the 19th of September next, in St. George's Church. IRONS. - The monument in memory of the late Dr. Irons was set up in

the burial ground of Christ Church, Ome-

mee, a few days ago by Mr. Farqhuarson of

Port Hope. It consists of four pieces of white marble, and stands nine feet high upon a plinth of freestone at the head of the grave. The spire is of prismatic form and stands 6f. 6in. upon a base one foot square. The striking feature of the whole column is the remarkable plainness and simplicity of its design, which is decidedly pleasing and appropriate. The inscriptions are as follows: On the east side, in basso-relievo: " la memory of Dr. John Irons, born Jan. 7th, 1822, died March 10th, 1862. He was a native of the County Fermanagh, Ireland, and emigrated to this country in the year "In memory of William Wallace. rons, son of Dr. J. Irons, born in New Brinswick July 1st, 1844, died Dec. 18th. 863." On the west side: "This monun at was erected by the Orangemen of the District of Emily in memory of the late Bro. Dr. John Irons, who at various times held ominent offices in the Grand Lodge of B. A. and who, during a period of 11 years, illed the office of County Master with crelit to himself and to the Orange Bo 'v, which office he held at the time of his death. In SWI him every Bro. lost a true triend, and the Institution one of its warmest and strongest supporters."
