

THE SANGSTER CASE.

THE DOCTOR'S DEFENCE. Doctor Sangster has written an exeedingly violent and bitter letter to the Globe, from which we extract the most important points, in order that our readers may hear both sides :-"In your editorial of last Saturday you repeat a statement first made in your editorial of the previous Tuesday, to the effect that a document now in

my possession and purporting to be my former wife's confession of adultry, and signed by her in presence of two relia-ble and respectable witnesses, is a forgery. It is my intention to at once take such steps as will satisfy my fellow-teachers of the authenticity of this and the other documents bearing on my case. Ultimately I shall probably afford you an ample opportunity of proving or dis-proving your base allegations in regard to this as well as other matters. * *

You are most anxious that I should withdraw from my candidature. *

* * Now I pledge myself to retire at once if you produce any document with my signature to it, which by any exercise of ingenuity can be twisted into having any complexion such as you ascribe to it. And, on the other hand, if you do not and cannot produce a document which you have thus distinctly and maliciously asserted is in existence, I presume it will penetrate even your dense moral consciousness that you stand before the world a convicted liar. Seven letters in all were written by me to my former wife. One in Jany., 1865,

one in July 1866, one in May and two in June, 1869, and one in May and one in June, 1870. The second and the last two of these, would, had you referred to them, completely expose the weakness of the cause you have espoused since they fully discuss the question of adultery and divorce. Had you been honest in your efforts to enlighten the public, you would have published the whole series of letters in detail. Instead of doing so, you select the only two in which, with the exception of the first, the question of divorce does not arise, and from these you make garbled extracts to suit your purposes. With the exception of these letters, however. the only document over my name which has or lever had an existence in this connection is an agreement, now in my ossession, in which, in consideration of the solerin promise on the part of my former wife, " That she will not hereafter seek to see or to communicate communicate with any of the children of the said John H. Sangster, except with his written consent first obtained.' I. on my part. make a promise to the effect that I "will, as far as in his (my) power, bring up his (my) children

in ignorance of the causes which have driven him (me) to seek a divorce from the said Mary Sangster, and in all circumstances, to be as tender of their recollections of their mother as the case will permit. THE GLOBE'S REPLY. In replying to the first paragraph the

This is exactly what we should like to see done. We have asked again and and we have never received anything in reply but unsupported statements of one of the parties to a very disagreeable scandal. The name of no reliable individual has ever been mentioned who has seen such documents as are desired. The witnesses to the signature of the allegedconfession have never either diare alleged to have taken in the transacare alleged to have taken in the transac-tion; while, on the other hand, the person most directly implicated has solemnly repudiated ever having signed such a document, and has dared Dr.

Sangster to the production of any paper of the kind. Let this document be produced, so that the public may judge how much importance is to be attached to the revelations it contains. The lost sentence in the paragraph quoted promises us ample opportunity for verifying the different statements

he represents her to have been, that would not interfere with the fact, unde-nied and undeniable, that she was jealous—"Insansly and groundlessly jeal-ous," according to her husband's state-ment—as far back as 1867, and that by reason of the attentions Dr. S. was then paying to the person with whom his subsequent career has been so sadly and fatally linked. That Mrs Sangster had good reason for being jealous the subsequent course of events has made abruptly menifest. It is with that whole question that he has to deal. He must show how it came to pass, compatible with innocence and honor on his part, that he proposed marriage within a few weeks after he had forced his wife from his house by threats that if she did not take \$300 a year and leave he would so self leave for the States and defy her to recover a cent. He must show that all the courtship, that can be testified to by scores, which took place before his wife had left his house, and before a word had been said about divorce, was becoming in the head of an educational institution like the Normal School, and in the father of a family, as he was. Let him "rise and explain" how he threatened the father of his present associate

with a civil suit if that father did not cease complaining of the way his daughter was transcressing with the Head Masto of the Normal School. Let him show that it was becoming on his part to write, while he was still Head Mas-ter of the Normal School, and an undivorced married man, a letter to this same young lady-who was a teacher under his charge and a mere girl, infatuated by his attentions—beginning "My Dar-ling," in which he gravely proposed that she should go off to the States with him, that he should there get a divorce, a machine to examine it before purchasing elsewhere. Was that the conduct of a man sadden ed and crushed through his wife's fall, and anxious about the credit and com-fort of his children? And was it the MR. J. W. FINNEY right thing in that very letter to express some degree of jealonsy about the attentions of a young man whom he calls "McL!" Let-him explain how he came to persuade an unmarried girl to leave her father's house and go off from this city in a surreptitious manner—if not in his company, at least with his aid

and connivance, and then go with him through a form of marriage which he knew was of no more value in Canada than the paper on which it was written. These and such like are the points which have to he grappled with, and which neither Dr. Sangster nor one of his friends has up to this hour ever even attempted either to explain or to deny.

* * We are willing to stand by every charge we have made and every word we have written in connection with a matter so painfully disagree-able and offensive that we can say of it in all honesty, "Better it had been "discussed by others than by us; bet-"ter by us than by no one."
