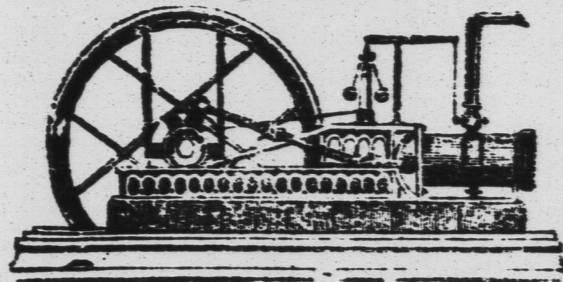

During the past week mass meetings have been held in Cobourg and Port Hope in the interest of the Dunkin Bill, which is to be submitted to the vote of the people of these towns on the 15th inst. The meetings have been crowded to excess, and have been addressed by Mrs. Yeomans, of Picton, the Rev. E. H. Dewart, editor of the *Christian Guardian*, Toronto, Rev. Mr. McKay, of Baltimore, and some of the resident ministers of the town. In connection with these meetings the Hine movement has been started in Cobourg, and about five hundred persons have signed the pledge.

Mr. John Thompson, of this village, narrowly escaped losing the sight of one or both his eyes while shooting at a mark with a Spencer breech-loading rifle a few days ago.
