GRATUITOUS ADVERTISING.—Our town  
 contemporary the other day had a judi-  
 cious and timely article on the imposi-  
 tions made on the press in respect to  
 gratuitous advertising. We cordially  
 agree with the sentiments therein ex-  
 pressed. We have had strong convic-  
 tions on the subject for a long time, be-  
 cause we felt that in the matter of no-  
 tices—especially for such as partook of  
 a benevolent or religious character—  
 newspaper publishers were daily asked  
 to do for nothing what they had as  
 much right to charge for as the grocer or  
 dry goods merchant who offered his  
 wares for sale. The publisher offers  
 his space in the same way as these mer-  
 chants do their goods, and when socie-  
 ties, churches, or individuals ask to  
 give gratuitous notices to all the meet-  
 ings, entertainments, concerts, etc.,  
 which are set up for some special pur-  
 pose, they just ask them to forego so  
 much of their legitimate revenue.—  
 Joseph Mercury.

The Peterbor-  
 ough Review expresses hearty

 says: "The local newspapers will  
 work in unison to accomplish the carry-  
 ing out of the suggestions laid down in

## BOBCAYGEON.

**HORSE THIEVES.**—Last Saturday  
 evening the village was thrown into a  
 perfect fever of excitement by the in-

 but imagine his surprise when on visit-  
 ing the prison he found it broken  
 and the birds flown. One of them  
 must have had a pretty good knife con-  
 cealed for with one he cut through a  
 two-inch plank of dry ash, and so man-  
 aged to crawl through the bars of the  
 window, then breaking off the pad-lock  
 which fastened the outer door liberat-  
 ed his companion. The constable im-  
 mediately telegraphed to different  
 points and one of them was appre-  
 hended in Lindsay on Monday.

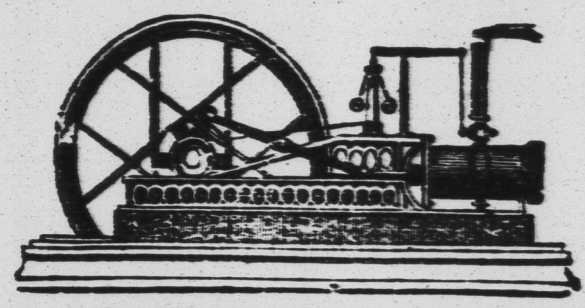
