Cows giving milk will need liberal feeding: if allowed to "fall off" now, the flow of milk can not be brought up again before cold weather sets in. See also that there is an abundant supply of fresh water for the dairy. The sheep are excellent for picking up the "seatterings" from most crops, and the flock should be turned into the harvested fields to do this work.
