



Unhappy Irreland.— Disturbances continue at Belmullet. Thus far four persons wounded in the affray of the 27th alt. have died and six moredeaths are expected. Two hundred military and two hundred police are on the spot. The roads leading to Aglow are blockaded with stones, and the bridge has been broken for the purpose of impeding the movements of the military. Gilhooly, secretary of the Bantry branch of the land league, has been arrested under the coercion act.

The Land Court's Business.—The business of the Irish Land Court still increases, and there are now 45.000 applications before it for the reduction of rent. There is at present no general strike against the payment of rent, but it is said that in many cases tenants refuse to pay unless reductions are made. The quiet has been so general that the government has relaxed some of the precautious before deemed necessary, but the fire is apparently yet smouldering and ready to break out. Serious agrarian outrages are reported in this morning's despatches, and the mysterious "Captain Moonlight" occasionally walks abroad.

RLASPHEMERS PUNISHED.—People in the Little Rock (Arkansas) region are much exercised over two remarkable events which have just been reported. Robert Nelson, aged 70, has suffered heavily by reason of the long-continued drought, and one day began cursing the Lord for permitting such an affliction. While thus engaged he suddenly fell backward, having been stricken by paralysis. He has not spoken since. A similar occurrence is reported in Union county, where a young man named J. Freeman, who had spoken blasphemously of the Lord for not sending rain was struck by lightning and killed. These incidents were topics of several preachers on Sunday.

LEFROY SENTENCED.—The trial of Lefroy for the murder of Mr. Gold clos-ed on Tuesday. The court room was densely crowded. A remarkable number of women were present. densely crowded. The Lord Chief-Justice's summing up for the prosecution, which lasted three or four hours, was strongly against the prisoner, and tended to throw discredit on the point on which the defence relied, that Lefroy had not pawned the pistol and showed an entire disbelief in the prisoner's assertion that a third person was in the car at the time of the murder. The prisoner was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. After sentence was passed Lefroy protested his innocence.

It has already made considerable ravages in Aden, and has reached Mecca, where the Mussulmen are imploring their prophet. Two other epidemics attract serious attention. The dirst is the yellow fever in Senegal, where the number of victims has been great, and the diptheria, which has killed more people in the south of Russia than any other epidemic, not excepting the plague. It has prevailed there since 1872. In Bessurabia 15,000 out of 36,000 persons who were attacked have succumbed to it. Out of 46,000 cases, 10,000 ended faraily, and in Kharkoff, out of 20,000 cases there have been 17,000 deaths.
