Why not have Cattle Fairs at Lindsay. Would it not be a good idea to establish monthy cattle fairs at Lindsay, at which liberal prizes would be given for the best fat beast exhibited would be given for the best fat beast exhibited for sale? This would attract sellers and buyers and be of considerable benefit to the town. There has been a great improvement in stock in this district during the last few years and a little judicious enterprise would make Lindsay a first class cattle market. We observe that Port Perry has established a series of monthly cattle fairs, and the first came off a week ago last Thursday. The Port Perry Standard says the fair proved a decided success, in spite of the prevailing snow drifts, which deterred many intending exhibitors from bringing in their fat cattle. The snow, however, did not prevent one enterprising farmer from driving a heifer in his sleigh from Pickering, a distance of about twenty miles. He was rewarded by selling his heifer, having first obtained a prize. Mr. Walker realized 390 for his heifer. The judges were Messrs. Jas. Graham, seugog; Antrew Ross and James Lang. The prizes were awarded as follows:—Fat ox or steer, 1st Chas Fallis, 2nd James Prince. Fat cow or heifer, ist E. Walker, 2nd J. Forrest. Fat sheep, ist and 2nd, James Cottle. The fair will in future be held on the second Tuesday in each month, thus giving buyers the chance of buying on Tuesday in Saintfield, Wednesday at Manchester, and thishing up and shipping from Port Perry on Thursday. Substantia prizes will be given at least four times during the year, and the Standard hopes that the farmers in the neighborhood will, by bringing in their cattle for sale, assist the townspeople in their endeavors to establish a good fair in Port Perry.
