COUNTY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS .- The regular session of the county council was held lest week according to statute.

Mr. J. B. Scott was re-elected warden. Mr. Michael Brown was appointed auditor by the council and Mr. J. H. Delamere by the warden. Mr. S. S. Peck, M. P. P., addressed the council regarding its financial position. He said the railway debentures which fell due on the 1st of January had been dishonoured, and this necessarily produced a condition of affairs which required grave consideration and also im-ediate action. As their representative he had gone to the provincial government and had been most kindly received by Mr. Mowat who had constantly expressed soli-citude for the prosperity of the district. He explained to the government the exact position of affaire, and at their request had drawn up a written document placing on record the condition of the county. A consultation followed and he had suggested that if a committee of investigation were appointed it would give great in-fluence to the report of that committee if the government would permit one of the cabinet ministers to sit upon it. He was both happy and proud to say that the government had given its assent, and he was there for the purpose of suggesting to the council the desirability of such a com-mittee being appointed. The duty of that committee should be to investigate, to prepare statements, to mature some practical plan for obtaining relief, and to see the creditors of the county with a view to making some agreement. The committee would of course report to the council. Mr. Peck gave a clear and concise statement of the council Peck gave a clear and concise statement of the exigency of the moment, and pointed out that the moment had arrived when some definite conclusion would have to be arrived at, for the transfer of the lands of the English company to an individual and the sale of the whole block at the price of about \$80,000 would reduce the assessed value of the county from something like \$600,000 to \$250,000 and whilst property to the first named amount could pay the taxes needed for the liabilities, the last named amount was quite insufficient. Mr. Peck concluded by begging that this important matter might be considered without any reference to politics, and by pointing out that as the government had consented that one of its members might sit on the comone of its members might sit on the committee they would have with them all the influence of the government in arriving at a satisfactory conclusion. The council was subsequently addressed by Mr. Dover, Mr. Niven, and Mr. Bemister, from Haliburton, and by Judge Whiteside, who each supported the appointment of the committee. Several speeches were made by members of the council and by made by members of the council and by the Warden, and by general consent the debate was adjourned until next Wednes-
