The inconveniences of travelling in cold weaweather have been aggravated by the heavy fall of snow during the past two weeks. On Thursday afternoon of last week a regular blizzard set in, and blew from the north and west with almost Manitoba ferocity. The effect was that inside of three hours travel all over the lines of the Midland was stopped. The party of Toronto curlers who had that day been playing at Lindsay were on the evening train for Toronto. The train pioughed into a drift in a cutting about two miles below Cambray station and stuck fast. The Toronto men faced the situation and walked to Cambray and bribed a farmer to drive the crowd back to Lindsay, for \$5. Before the man had got half way to town he regretted that he had not exacted \$15. An engine was sent out from Lindsay to pull back the biocked train, but the "auxilliary power" never reached the scene of the blockade until twenty-four hours afterwards. The snow plow driven by two engines was put on to clear the line from Orillia south, and was followed by the afterno in express. Both trains were delayed at Lorneville by the Cambray blockade, and lay there from Thursday night until Friday afternoon at three o'clock. Toronto trains coming to Lindsay were all thrown out of time and laid up at Lorneville, many of the passengers being three days in getting through to Lindsay from Toronto. Friday afternoon the train that blocked the line was dug out and five engines dragged the train to the siding at Cambray Station, opening the line for traffic on Saturday morning. An attempt was made to run the set in, and blew from the north and west with blocked the line was dug out and five engines dragged the train to the siding at Cambray Station, opening the line for traffic on Saturday morning. An attempt was made to run the trains on the Victoria branch, but after driving an engine and coach as far as Cameron station, the attempt was abandoned. The snow plow was run through on Sunday and on Monday trains were running as usual. The narrow gauge line from Lorneville north was even more tirmly blocked than the lines running east and west by south, and it toook two days of hard unremitting work to dig a passage for trains through the snowy and attoook two days or nard unremitting work to dig a passage for trains through the snowy obstructions. Our Lorneville correspondent gives a graphic description of the doings at that place during the blockade.
